SAFE TODDLES MISSION is to provide parents with a white cane solution for keeping their babies with a mobility visual impairment or blindness safe to explore and learn.

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THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF SAFE TODDLES

We are pleased to share the impact that your support made in 2023. We increased distribution of the Pediatric Belt Cane by 40 percent, with more than 600 Belt Canes shipped to parents and professionals in 36 countries. Furthermore, we provided educational support to families, caregivers, and professionals; enhanced our Pediatric Belt Cane curriculum; conducted testing to improve Belt Cane functioning; and programmed our first Smart Mobility app for smartphones. None of this would be possible without your support for our mission.

Since 2018, medical and educational professionals have embraced Safe Toddles' Belt Cane as a tool for addressing the walking needs of their patients and students. In 2023, medical professionals recognized that the Pediatric Belt Cane is a medical necessity for children with a MVI/B to walk. Children's Hospitals and Durable Medical Equipment suppliers now bill Medicaid for Belt Canes. Belt Canes are listed on students' individual service plans and purchased through state education funds. The Pediatric Belt Cane is the only solution for joyful walking and running because it allows children with a MVI/B to feel safe.

That's why 600 Belt Canes in one year—as proud as we are of that milestone—is just a tiny splash in an ocean of need. We estimate that around 2,000 children around the world have had their lives changed by the Belt Cane. However, every year in the United States, more than 5,000 babies are born blind or visually impaired. Globally, around seven million children aged 11 months to five years are severely visually impaired (World Health Organization, 2021). There are a great many children who would benefit from having a Belt Cane, yet too few people know about Safe Toddles and our mission.

Northern Illinois University completed a two-year study, funded by the Lavelle Fund for the Blind, in October of 2023. The findings of this study—that children with a MVI/B thrive when provided with a two-step safety buffer as they learn to navigate their world—affirmed the results of prior research. Safe Toddles' Belt Cane gives those children the ability to feel safe in any environment and participate in most activities essential for healthy growth and development.

Thanks to your support, our groundbreaking Pediatric Belt Cane—a first-of-its-kind device, and the world's only wearable white cane—offers a solution for people all over the world caring for blind babies. As we approach our 10th anniversary, we want to thank you for believing in our mission. As the only nonprofit dedicated to providing children with a MVI/B with a white cane solution designed specifically for them, our mission is as important now as it has ever been. We look forward to sharing more exciting updates with you as 2024 unfolds.

ONGOING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE PEDIATRIC BELT CANE

In 2023, our R&D team focused their efforts on making the Belt Cane easier for children to use in even more settings. The result is that we are moving to a new tip design in 2024 – the Omni Wheel. In addition to being quieter and functioning better on a wider variety of terrain, the inclusion of these wheels makes it less likely that the Belt Cane will sway from side to side without the user's deliberate input.

Throughout our testing, we are listening to Belt Cane users and are committed to hearing what they have to tell us. We are learning together, and we are unwavering in our support of safe mobility for children with a MVI/B.

NICHOLAS was born blind. He was 2 years old when his therapist recommended to his family to get him a Pediatric Belt Cane.

Before getting a Belt Cane, Nico would only take a few steps when he was holding on to a support walker or pushing a table ahead of him. The need to hold on to large objects limits a child's ability to engage with the world.

His parents wanted a Belt Cane to help him "explore his surroundings and give him the encouragement to start walking on his own."

Nico wears his Belt Cane and is walking on his own now. The power of safety is seen in every one of these children's stories. When children feel safe, they are free to take risks. Risks like running around inside a grocery store exploring the different packaging and paths through the aisles.

Nico is learning the rules, like stay near the cart. He also is learning how to help mom put groceries in the cart. Nico is a bigger part of family life because he is independent.

Nico is blind due to Acute Retinal Necrosis.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS

DR. AMBROSE-ZAKEN IS
THE FOREMOST SCHOLAR in

the field of early intervention orientation and mobility for children with a MVI/B. She introduced the term "mobility visual impairment or blindness" (MVI/B), which specifically identifies a child for whom a white cane mobility tool—such as the Pediatric Belt Cane—is a medical and educational necessity.

A Small Business Innovation Research grant from the U.S. Department of Education's Institute of Education Sciences supported the DEVELOPMENT OF OUR NEW SMART BELT CANE and accompanying SmartMobility app for smartphones. We created these innovations, in partnership with Soterix Medical, to assist families, caregivers, and professionals in easily accessing our Belt Cane curriculum and assessment features.

In 2023, the Pediatric Belt Cane was recognized by Medicaid to be **A MEDICALLY NECESSARY DEVICE** for infants with a MVI/B to walk.

Independent researchers from Northern Illinois
University validated Dr. Ambrose-Zaken's prior
published research on the Belt Cane's effects
on the walking ability and daily physical activity
of children under five with a MVI/B. Other
independent PEDIATRIC OPHTHALMOLOGIST
INVESTIGATIONS ALSO AFFIRMED THE

Yakir Katz & Edie Ambrose

NEW RESEARCH FINDINGS

Northern Illinois University's two-year study of 124 participants, funded by the Lavelle Fund for the Blind, asked parents: Why do you want a wearable white cane? Parents revealed that their children's visual impairment made it unsafe for them to move about without help, and that they were seeking a mobility tool for their children's safety.

In the 50 participants who had the potential to walk, NIU studied their walking ability and amount of physical activity both before and after the introduction of a Belt Cane. Before using the Belt Cane, the children with a MVI/B spent 80 percent of their time sitting down, standing still, or walking while holding onto someone for support. After being introduced to the Belt Cane, these same children spent 80 percent of their time walking or standing independently. Children who previously relied on adult assistance simply to stand were now able to stand, and even move about, without any help other than their mobility tool because they felt safe and secure wearing their Pediatric Belt Canes.



EASTON was 18 months old when his therapist recommended to his family to get him a Pediatric Belt Cane.

Before getting a Belt Cane, Easton was as able to walk, but his lower vision isn't developed. That means, he will often get tripped up on different surfaces, steps, etc. The result is he needs to hold a hand to be safe when walking, because lower field loss is very tricky.

Easton can see in his upper field that his mom is near, but he can't see the drop-off just below him. This causes him to take a step towards his mom and fall, because he didn't see the drop off.

His parents wanted a Belt Cane "to help Easton navigate new places without missing and tripping on different items or surfaces."

In the pictures, Easton is learning to navigate in a hospital. He is feeling the braille/tactile sign and learning about his world. His parents can stand back and allow him to explore to on his own.

Easton is mobility visually impaired due to Optic Nerve Hypoplasia.

SOPHIE-GRACE was just shy of 2 years old when her therapist recommended to her family to get a Pediatric Belt Cane.

Before getting a Belt Cane, Sophie was able to walk, but her parents saw her freeze and cry every time the walking surface changed colors, and she tripped over obstacles she didn't know were in her way. After all those falls and trips, Sophie-Grace seemed to always want to hold her mom's hand - she didn't feel safe to let go, so she couldn't join in on the fun.

Her family hoped the Belt Cane would enable her "to explore her surroundings safely and interact with her peers."

Since having the Belt Cane in front of her to warn her of the bumps, drops and other changes in her path she has become very independent. In the bottom picture, she is confidently stepping down a curb. In the top picture, Sophie is climbing her way through a play scape designed to challenge kids her age in ways they find rewarding.

Her mom was able to stand back and watch her little girl safely and independently climb, slide, and have fun with her friends.

Sophie-Grace is mobility visually impaired due to a combination of Cortical Visual Impairment, Optic Nerve Hypoplasia, and Optic Albinism.


